INFO AND LESSON PLANS

Description

All at Sea by Mary Leonard Hurt (appropriate for grades K-2) When a fisherman reels in Polly, a blob of pollution, it's up to a turtle and pelican to help him learn about protecting our beaches and waterways from litter.

The Marshmallow Mystery by Mary Leonard Hurt (appropriate for grades 3-5) In this old-fashioned melodrama, a milkman is an unlikely hero who must foil the dastardly scheme of Miser Lee, the villain.

All at Sea Lesson Plans

- 1. Make a class poster or individual sheets for students to write (or draw or paste pictures of) examples of ways they can help protect the environment and reduce pollution.
- 2. Making certain choices can ADD to or SUBTRACT from pollution at the beach.

All at Sea

ADD to or SUBTRACT from Pollution

- 1. Salty Sarah went to the beach to fish and brought a picnic lunch with her. There were 8 empty soda cans scattered near her picnic spot. She threw down 3 more. How many cans were now on the beach?
- 2. She opened a bag that held 20 chips and ate 5. How many chips were left in the bag?
- 3. Sarah was still hungry, so she ate 4 more. Now how many were left?
- 4. Sarah ate the rest of her chips, a sandwich, an apple, and 4 chocolate chip cookies. How many items did she eat?
- 5. The chips, sandwich, apple, and cookies were in separate plastic bags. When she was finished, Sarah threw all the bags on the beach. How many bags were there?
- 6. Now Sarah got out her fishing pole and cast the line out into the sea. She thought she had a big fish on the line, but pulled in Polly Waddle. Polly was made up of 12 sandwich bags, 3 used juice boxes, 5 soda cans, and 2 candy wrappers. How many items were these?
- 7. Polly also had 2 sets of plastic rings that hold soda cans. Each set could hold 6 cans. How many cans total could the plastic rings hold?
- 8. Sarah felt bad that she had caused part of the problem. She looked around the spot where she was standing and decided to clean up. She counted 36 items to begin with. She picked up 10 cans and took them over to a recycle bin. How many items were left?
- 9. Now she picked up 8 empty juice boxes and put them in the trash. How many items were left?
- 10. Finally, she picked up 6 plastic bags. Now how many more items would she still need to pick up before the beach was completely clean?

Writing Propts

- 1. As we learn from this play, not all heroes wear magical capes and perform feats of super strength. Think about someone you know personally who is a hero to you. Describe this person and explain why you think he or she is a hero. You could provide (or draw) a picture of your person.
- 2. Tell a story about a time you were a hero to someone else.
- 3. Minerva has a magical music box that makes pennies while it plays music. Imagine that you owned a magical music box. Tell a story about what kind of music your box would play and what kind of special power it would have.


Antonyms
